Threat to our Green Belt

The parish council's spring newsletter reported that the planning application for developing the land between Burtons Lane and Lodge Lane was about to be considered by Buckinghamshire Council. On 21 April the council's planning committee decided unanimously to refuse the application. We posted this information on Facebook, on our website <u>http://savelittlechalfont.org.uk/</u>, and in communications to LCCA members.

We are now expecting the developers to appeal the decision and as soon as details are available, we will post the information with comments on our website http://savelittlechalfont.org.uk/.



Following recent statements from the government on planning policy, Buckinghamshire Council has now begun to move forward in preparing the Buckinghamshire Local Plan. It is still at an early stage but the Coordination Group (acting for the parish council and community association) is monitoring progress and will keep the community advised of significant developments.

To celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, a very excited school council from Chalfont Valley Primary Academy planted a new Hornbeam in Little Chalfont Nature Park on 25 May.

Led by Acting Head Mrs Elizabeth Wilson, the

children, chosen from each of the school's age groups, walked to the park from school, put the tree in place and enthusiastically took it in turns to replace the soil around it.

Hornbeams can live for over 300 years, a fitting, long lived tribute by the children to our Queen.

The jubilee tree was donated by Chalfont Valley Primary Academy and replaces an old Hornbeam, one of the Park's signature trees, which fell in a storm last year.


News from our Parish Council

Alongside its own plans for the occasion, Little Chalfont Parish Council was pleased to be involved with several other local events for the glorious celebration of the Queen's 70 years on the throne, over the weekend of 2-5 June 2022.

Sadly, the weather on some days of the celebration, over the weekend of 2-5 June 2022, was disappointing, to say the least, but no one allowed that to dampen their enthusiasm for the celebrations!

To mark this momentous anniversary, the council installed a six-metre high flagpole outside the village hall; in addition, new aluminium flagpoles were purchased to replace the old wooden flagpoles for shops and businesses in Little Chalfont. Over the celebration weekend,

The Little Chalfont Community Improvement Plan (CIP) represents the views and aspirations of the community, together with projects adopted under the priorities of the Amersham & Villages Community Board. All the current projects are joint initiatives between the parish council and the community association.



Environment and Climate Change There has been lots going on in Little Chalfont to progress ideas around the environment and climate change. Quarterly Environment Cafés are arranged in the Village Hall **(next event 17th Sept 10am-12 noon)** and local residents have started discussions around how best to co-ordinate efforts.

We are currently talking to similar groups in Chesham and Amersham about setting up a "Sustainable Little Chalfont" group to help co-ordinate and plan

any climate and environmental projects. This group will meet more often and will aim to bring about the change we know we need to see at a local level. The local priorities that came out of the first environment café focused on pollution/ traffic reduction, litter and the local footpaths. We have had lots of embryonic ideas that range from community fridges, community transport, energy reduction and insulation, plastic free initiatives, repair cafes to bike racks.
