Our first big initiative this year, which we announced at our AGM in April, is the imminent launch of a new, modernised, informative and interactive website. This will take over some of our membership





be a bigger and better than ever Village Day.

Farewell to Roger Funk

Presentation at AGM

We paid tribute to Roger Funk who stood down as Chairman at our AGM after 14 years in the post. Roger joined the committee shortly after the Village Society and Revitalisation group amalgamated and was elected Chairman in 2010.

His immediate focus was to increase the Association's profile around the village, both with residents and businesses. Roger took the lead in formulating responses for some immediate planning issues, in particular Chiltern District Council's core strategy, the development of 250 dwellings on the former Sawmill site off Bell Lane, the land at Snells Lane (the old Sculpture Field) and subsequently the development of the Donkey Field, now Brayfield Lane/Close, off Burtons Lane.

Roger took the lead in taking action where there would have been negative impact, leading objections where appropriate and liaising to ensure proper consultation and minimum disruption. He exemplified the importance of working in partnership with other local bodies and communicating with the village.

Over the last few years Roger has played a leading role in the campaign to stop the development of the former golf course and Homestead Farm. The hundreds of hours that Roger and the co-ordination group put into formulating the response should not be underestimated.

Although the result of the appeal was disappointing, their work continues to inform activity to obtain the best outcome for the village (see back page).

Under Roger's leadership the LCCA has initiated and supported projects which have become separate organisations, contributing significantly to the growing sense of community within Little Chalfont.

With a group of volunteers and many donations from local residents, Roger spearheaded the establishment of the Little Chalfont Charitable Trust to purchase the Sculpture Field, which became the highly successful Nature Park, run now by its own management group and maintained by the parish council.

Leading on from the LCCA's Good Neighbours initiative, Roger had the vision to create a dementia cafe in Little Chalfont, Cafe 22, which is now run as a separate charity.

He managed all this while continuing to ensure that the Community Association's core projects, our Community Improvement Plan, Christmas lights, hanging baskets, Village days and a twice yearly newsletter of local events and news, all functioned smoothly and on time, for the benefit of the whole community.

Kingdom, the United States and their allies to land substantial forces on mainland Europe during the Second World War, beginning the liberation of Western Europe.

Large audience for parish council annual meeting

The annual parish council meeting in May 2024 attracted some 100 people, as the highlight of the evening was an address by a representative of the Hill Group, the company that will be redeveloping the old golf course site between Burtons Lane and Lodge Lane.

After the presentation, there were a great many questions, so many that it was not possible to address them all at the meeting. Subsequently the Hill Group held extra sessions in the village hall, where people could drop

in to talk to the group about any concerns they may have.

Little Chalfont Community Foodbank collection

The Little Chalfont Community
Association, supported by the parish council, is committed to building a community where residents are caring towards each other and their neighbours. We continue our focus on highlighting our good neighbours, and spoke with Catherine Murphy who set up and organises the monthly food bank collection which takes place in Little Chalfont.



Catherine, why did you start the food bank collections in Little Chalfont?

As a governor of a local school, I became aware during the COVID lockdown that the Chiltern foodbank was very much in need of donations. We started a weekly collection and continued this during the lockdown.

Where is the food bank that you collect for based?

The Chiltern foodbank is based in Chesham, initiated and supported by the Trussell Trust who work with local communities to open foodbanks. It serves surrounding communities, including Little Chalfont and since the pandemic has been delivering food parcels to those in need.

How often do you arrange the collections?

When lockdown ended I became aware that the foodbank was still in need of donations, so we re-started a monthly collection on a Saturday, to coincide with the monthly Farmers' Market.

How does the collection process work?

The Trussell Trust make a list of what is needed every month, to ensure the food parcels they distribute are balanced, and meet community needs. The food items requested are generally easy to cook and serve.

We set up tents and tables in Chenies Parade and in the Cytiva car park from 9 to 12 noon on the second Saturday of every month (except August) and take in items of food from members of the local community.



We then transport the donated items to the foodbank distribution centre in Chesham, sometimes making two or three journeys with a loaded car.

What has impressed you most?

The generosity of residents in Little Chalfont is fantastic and in particular we appreciate those who collect and donate on behalf of their neighbours or local street.

What support do you receive from the Little Chalfont Community Association?

The Community Association help to publicise the collections and they publish the monthly lists of food requirements to their members—crucially they assist by lending and helping us to set up the tents.

How do you organise volunteers to manage the collection?

Via a WhatsApp group. We have a small group of volunteers who come for an hour, or 2 or 3 hours, or just to assist with the erecting and dismantling of the tents. We would love a few more volunteers to come forward, even for just an hour once or twice a year. No special skills are needed, simply the desire to help others and willingness to undertake a little gentle lifting.

Little Chalfont Park development

An update on progress

The pre-development phase of Little Chalfont Park, the site that incorporates the former golf course between Lodge Lane and Burtons Lane, is now underway. The archaeology survey is planned for July/August, although the construction phase is not due to start until early 2025.

The Hill Group, together with their partners (BD Landscape Architects, Barker Associates, CBRE, Cratus Group, i-Transport and JTP) have formed the Hill Team and are responsible for developing Little Chalfont Park.

The Hill Team is currently working towards securing full planning approval from Buckinghamshire Council by the end of this year. Once approved, activity on the site will become more evident as the Hill Team commences construction of up to 380 mixed tenure homes, up to 100 retirement homes, a 60 resident care home, as well as community and educational facilities.

To ensure the best outcome for Little Chalfont and to represent the interests of the community, the Little Chalfont Park Liaison Group (LCPLG) has been established with representatives from the Little Chalfont Parish Council and Little Chalfont Community Association.

The LCPLG is also being supported by a group of residents from roads affected by the Little Chalfont Park site known as the Little Chalfont (LC) Roads Network.

The LCPLG has been meeting with the Hill Team on a regular basis since early March raising issues of most concern to the local community as well as gaining a greater understanding of the development process and the associated timeline.

The LCPLG has engaged external advisers to review key documentation such as the Design Code and in due course the Reserved Matters Applications (RMAs – containing detail beyond that of the initial outline planning approval) and the Construction Management Plan.

The aim being to focus effort on the issues that matter most to the community and those where the LCPLG can have most positive effect.

The Hill Team is committed to undertaking extensive consultation with the community throughout the planning approval process and construction phases and to date has:

- held the first public consultation event in the village hall on 9th May attended by 300+ residents. Everyone, attendees or not, was given the opportunity to review and comment on the first draft of the Design Code by 24th May;
- committed to respond to both the LCPLG detailed review of the Design Code and the 80+ questions / comments submitted to date by the community and the LC Roads Network by the end of July; and
- commenced discussions to ensure that the community facility in Little Chalfont Park is developed in line with community needs.

It is worth noting that the vast majority of feedback from the first consultation event related to issues around infrastructure, namely the impact on the road network, public transport and the provision of services and utilities.

As the outline planning permission covers only development within the Little Chalfont Park site boundary, many of the concerns sit outside the remit of the Hill Team. As a result, the LCPLG and LC Roads Network are seeking further clarification from Buckinghamshire Council on these matters.

The Hill Team have also set up a freephone helpline 0800 0126 730.

As of 15th July, the site had been accessed 890 times with over 80 contact forms submitted.

The next public consultation will be held on **12**th **September** in the village hall between **2pm and 8pm** and will cover detailed proposals for the site.
